

Tracking payments and digital policy development in the leading multilateral fora

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2022 was a tough year for multilateralism. A search for "multilateralism in 2022" on Google returns results like "multilateralism tested," "the UN [...] made it," "strain on multilateralism," "reviving multilateralism" and similar commentary that confirms the challenges that this type of cooperation faced in 2022.

The <u>OECD 2022 Multilateral Development Finance Report</u> (OECD Report) identified three forces testing the identity, legitimacy, and capacity of the multilateral development system: political polarization, institutional fragmentation, and frequent global shocks. All these forces shaped multilateral digital policy efforts in the past year:

- (1) Increased poverty and vulnerability combined with accelerated digitization led to more focus on inclusion in digital policy.
- (2) Political polarization increased countries desire for digital sovereignty, resilience, and independence.
- (3) Climate shocks combined with accelerated digitalization led to multilateral mobilization for a green digital policy.

This Issue of the Multilateral Monitor pulls together our pick of the top five multilateral research and initiatives on digital policy that took place during the past year. Our hope is that it helps you connect the events of a very active year and prepare for another, which promises to be as demanding for digital policymaking.

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Financial Inclusion and Digital Payments

- <u>The Global Findex Database 2021</u> was launched after two years delay on 8 July 2022. You can also watch a presentation by the lead author Leora Klapper in this <u>Policy Research Talk</u>.
- The World Bank's very informative Fast Payment Toolkit, first published in November 2021, continued to expand in 2022. A new Technical Focus Noes on <u>Scheme Rules in Fast</u>
 Payments
 published in February 20200 and a <u>Brazil Pix Case Study</u> published in May 2022.
 Both are worth a read.
- The Bank of International Settlement (BIS) and its Innovation Lab published several important papers on CBDCs design features and lessons from experiments. Considering how much of the CBDCs development effort is justified by the pursuit of financial inclusion, the BIS FSI Insights paper Central bank digital currencies: a new tool in the financial inclusion toolkit?] is particularly useful for evaluating CBDCs developments.
- Improving the efficiency and affordability of cross-border payments continued to preoccupy multilateral policymakers. For a disruptive vision read the IMF Working Paper <u>A Multi-</u> Currency Exchange and Contracting Platform.

Digital Development
